What is media advocacy?

 The strategic use of mass media and community advocacy to advance a policy change



Behavior Change vs. Media **Advocacy Communication**

Behavior change communication:

strategic use of communication to promote positive health outcomes, usually by changing personal behaviors

Media advocacy communication:

strategic use of media focusing on the forces that shape behavior public and private policy—rather than personal behavior





Media Advocacy Can Help...

- Influence governments, donors and implementing partners to adopt or improve programs
- Overcome policy formulation and implementation barriers
- Enable evidence gathered on what works to influence policy and practice
- Bring new domestic funding for programs
- Ensure accountability





Ultimate outcome

Increased media coverage to keep family planning on the agenda and to influence family planning budget and policy outcomes at national and subnational levels



F.D.A. Should Ban the Sale of Mentholated Tobacco Products

I am pleased that the Food and Drug Administration is finally exercising its authority and regulating all tobacco products including e-cigarettes, cigars, hookah tobacco and pipe tobacco. Not only will the F.D.A. now establish provisions for the manufacturing, importation and retailing of all such tobacco products, but the new regulations will also cover: the pre-market review of the products, requirements to report ingredients and potentially harmful additives in the products, the placement of health warnings on product packaging and oversight of product marketing and advertising.

This is a huge step in tobacco prevention, and it will protect underprivileged communities who disproportionately suffer death and disease due to these products.

But the F.D.A. needs to do more.

Indeed, the F.D.A. needs to place a ban on the sale of mentholated tobacco products just as it did for flavored cigarettes. Research shows that a menthol ban could save <u>millions of lives</u> -- particularly black lives because mentholated cigarettes are the choice

Southern Asia urged to wind down coal to keep warming in check

KUALA LUMPUR (Thomson Reuters Foundation) - Countries in South and Southeast Asia must end their reliance on coal power plants and switch to clean energy in order to meet pledges to curb climate change and tackle air pollution, researchers said on Thursday.

A study from Perth-based think tank Climate Analytics warned that failure to do so threatened a global goal to limit warming.

"Plans for major new coal deployment in these regions alone could put the Paris Agreement objectives out of reach ... given that countries in South and Southeast Asia account for half of the world's planned coal power expansion," report author Paola Vanguas Parra said in a statement.

To Reach its Economic Dreams, Bangladesh Needs to Rethink Healthcare

Last month, Standard Chartered Bank announced that Bangladesh is among seven Asian countries whose Gross Domestic Product (GDP) will grow around 7 percent through 2020. In real terms, this means Bangladesh's GDP per capita is projected to
